

Begun in 2011 by volunteer dentist Dr. Michael Spradlin and and advisory board of prominent local dentists, the dental clinic offers over \$1 million in basic dental services to nearly 1,200 patients each year. These services include same-day appointments for extractions on Tuesday evenings, and hygiene and restorative care during the remainder of the week.

Dr. Jennifer Cook joined CCEOK as the clinic director in 2012. Along with treating patients herself, she manages clinic operations and a small, but mighty team of dental assistants. With such a small staff, how do you suppose the clinic is able to deliver the quantity and quality of services they do? Volunteers, of course!

The clinic relies on the services of nearly 100 volunteers each year. These volunteers include dentists, many of whom volunteer on a regular basis, both at the extraction clinic and for restorative care during the week. Dental students from OU College of Dentistry in OKC and the Tulsa location, hygiene students from OU Hygiene in Bartlesville, and Tulsa Community College, and

other volunteers considering a career in the dental field play an essential part in advancing the mission of caring for everyone who seeks dental care.

Patients receive care through two main avenues. Those in pain or needing extractions seek consult and care by calling the clinic Tuesday morning for an appointment the same afternoon. Those patients having broader dental needs may apply to be seen for comprehensive care, including a treatment plan, dental hygiene care, restorative dentistry and complete and partial dentures. Once treatment is complete, a list of other dental resources is given to the patient and they are asked to find a permanent dental home.

In the future, Dr. Cook plans to continue to grow both the student and private practice volunteer base to help more of those in need of care.

A New Old Program Returns to CCEOK

A program that has returned to campus after a brief hiatus -Refugee Resettlement (RR) - is how Catholic Charities helps 'welcome the stranger' to Tulsa.

CCEOK has been resettling refugees in eastern Oklahoma since the 1970s, as a part of the U.S. State Department's Refugee Resettlement Program. Under this program, each year the President decides how many refugees those who've been forced to flee their homes due to war or persecution - will be allowed to resettle here. From 2000-2017, the average number of refugees admitted to the U.S. each year was 75,000. During 2017 - 2020, refugee admissions dipped to alltime lows and, with so few refugees arriving in Oklahoma, the decision was made to consolidate, with Catholic Charities in OKC overseeing all refugee resettlement for the state and CCEOK shuttering its program temporarily in May of 2019. Since that time, refugee admissions have increased to previous levels, allowing CCEOK to re-open its refugee resettlement program in October of 2022.

Some of the faces in the new RR program may be familiar from their work as either volunteers or employees from the Afghan Resettlement program (APA), or in CCEOK's former program.

Like all CCEOK programs, volunteers make it possible for the RR program to provide incredible hospitality and to welcome refugees to Tulsa.

Ally Fjeldsted, the new
Community Outreach
Coordinator, said volunteer
roles like airport welcomes and
housing set ups can make a big
difference for the person or
family arriving to Tulsa.

"That warm welcome at the airport is a refugee's first impression and experience in the place that is their new home," she said. "I've seen how that weight of uncertainty has been lifted when a refugee walks into a home that's been set up just for them. It's so nice that our volunteers get to play that part in a refugee's resettlement journey."

Volunteers for this program have different options based on how much they want to be involved.

"One thing that's nice about volunteering with our program is that there is a full range of participation levels. This program is really exciting and calls for a lot of community engagement, so there's a lot of great volunteers I have the opportunity to work with," Ally added.

Taking care of refugees and migrants has been a key theme of Pope Francis' pontificate. He has consistently emphasized the need to welcome, protect, promote and integrate them into society.
