# Afghan family escapes for new life in Tulsa

When Fazl and Aria first arrived in Tulsa with their 25-day old baby, Arshia, who was born on an American military base, they knew no one and had no home. Despite these challenges, the couple had been determined to get out of Afghanistan, where the Taliban threatened their safety along with so many others.

Fazl and Aria are an exceptional couple; both are educated with college degrees and speak excellent English. Their level of education is not common in Afghanistan, but allowed Fazl to support his family along with his mother and sister. his brother worked for over six years at the U.S. Embassy in Afghanistan. The promise of a green card meant that eventually, Fazl and Aria would be able to move to the United States. But, as the situation in Afghanistan deteriorated last August and the American government left, Fazl and his family were forced to find their own way out. Thankfully, they made it onto an overcrowded military plane to leave Kabul.

> Because of Fazl's involvement with the U.S. government, the small family became an instant target. Not long after the family left, the Taliban broke into the home of Fazl's mother and sister, demanding to know if the family was there. Luckily, after searching the home and finding nothing, the Taliban left leaving only shattered glass behind.

While Fazl is still able to contact his family via phone, communication is shaky due to constant power outages.

Fazl enjoys working for First Oklahoma Bank, has recently gotten his driver's license, and even purchased a car with the help of a loan from his employer. Aria plans to continue her studies and hopes to work from home while caring for Arshia. Both are ambitious and have gotten off to a great start in their new home. Fazl says, "Now we just want to help other Afghan families who do not speak English."

## A community effort...

Settling 800 refugees in Tulsa has been a huge community effort. Many hands are needed to make sure the refugees are cared for well: from the initial airport pickup to moving the families from temporary housing into their own apartments and homes. That's where volunteers like Felix Cuellar and Susan Edwards come in.

Felix and Susan are long-time volunteers at Catholic Charities. Pre-pandemic, they spent their time working in the kitchen and distributing food. Additionally, Susan taught classes at Madonna House. Throughout COVID, Felix and Susan also

volunteered in the food pantry and, in September, transitioned to helping the Afghan refugee program.

They began driving people to doctors' appointments, cultural orientation classes, and other places they needed to go. Throughout their time driving, Felix and Susan have developed friendships with several of the Afghan families and have worked to advocate for their needs. They hope to continue supporting them as they adjust to life in the United States.

Fazl, Aria, Susan, and Felix come from vastly different backgrounds, but all call Tulsa home. Thanks to the efforts of so many volunteers and community partners, our new Afghan neighbors continue to be welcomed with love.
