The Adult Education program has a new Volunteer Coordinator. Her name is Joell Griswold. Joell is a mother of three, a former STEM and Specials teacher at Oologah, a small-business owner, real estate agent and has a background in medical recruiting. She came to Catholic Charities last fall when she heard through a friend about an opening in the department.

Even with a number of dedicated volunteers, both core and substitute, Joell is in dire need of additional Spanish-speaking substitute teachers for the HiSET (High School Equivalency Test) program. This program offers language arts (reading and writing), math, science and social studies classes to adults who can earn their high school diplomas when they pass the HiSET exam. No specific knowledge in any of these subjects is required, because the curriculum is predetermined and a basic requirement to communicate the contents is all that is needed.

HiSET classes are offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays, at 9am, 10:30am, and 6pm. English as a Second Language (ESL) classes are offered at the same times, but on Mondays and Wednesdays. Between 30 and 35 core volunteers teach both offerings this semester, but only about 8 to 10 substitutes are available to

cover the unavailable core volunteers currently. Next semester, the program may need additional core volunteers and substitutes, as the offerings or staffing levels may change.

Volunteers spend time in the classroom and can prepare for each week's class in about an hour to 90 minutes – so not much additional time is required outside the classroom.

The semester schedule follows that of the Tulsa Public Schools – this semester goes up until the first week in May and graduation is set for May 21st.

The HiSET program is really preparation for an exam – so the number of semesters and a class schedule is determined on an individual basis. Classes are offered in both English and Spanish at CC. There is a waiting list to get into the ESL classes.

Joell is trying to get the word out to parishes and through other outlets that there IS an Adult Education program at CC, to solicit additional students and... volunteers... because without a dedicated group of core and substitute volunteers, NONE of this would happen.

Did you know CCEOK is a welcoming and certified waystation for the migrating monarch butterfly? Thanks to the work of Catholic Charities' garden team, milkweed and nectar plants are growing in front of Madonna House, which has been an official monarch waystation since March 2023. Monarchs can also be seen in our main garden too!

According to a recent Oklahoma City Zoo social media post, "...the overwintering population of monarchs has decreased by nearly 60% from last year." And, lower numbers mean there could be fewer monarchs during their summer migration. The zoo, and others, are asking everyone to do their part in planting flowers helpful to the monarchs so the population can rebound.

"We have to do all we can to preserve the monarchs and support their migration," added CCEOK's Garden Coordinator, Anita Mills.
