So, we stood in the parking lot and discussed an upcoming newsletter article Dennis was writing concerning why people selflessly volunteer so much time at CCEOK. It was as though Socrates and Plato were having a great philosophical conversation in Proctor Hollow! I commented that during a recent wait at Hiland Dairy in Chandler, I found a book (Holy Moments- A Handbook for the Rest of Your Life) in the CCEOK truck. As Dennis and I pushed the 2,100-pound potato totes onto CCEOK trucks, we reminded ourselves how our time in purgatory was being rapidly reduced by our work we may have even banked some "credit" in our purgatory accounts.

During the return trip, one of my seven sisters called me and asked what I was doing. I responded "hauling potatoes halfway across the state for CCEOK". She commented what would CCEOK do without me? I responded the Holy Spirit would still accomplish the Lord's mission.

My comment made me reflect on the philosophical discussion Dennis and I had earlier: Why do CCEOK volunteers selflessly give so much time? Is it because the volunteers listened to the Holy Spirit and that it led them to CCEOK to accomplish the Lord's mission?

While recognizing that through me, God is working...I am the one who is being blessed! I am being blessed by not only what I am doing as a deacon but also by working in this wonderful agency we call CCEOK!
